Minutes of the Horseless Carriage Club Meeting

Jack called the meeting to order at 7:01 pm, and everyone one stood as Ernie led the pledge of allegiance, followed by Bruce leading the prayer.

Jack thanked all the members and guests in attendance today. We have 13 HCC members and 1 guests, so we are unable to vote on anything. We don't have enough members in attendance tonight to approve previous minutes.

Charles presented his treasurer's report explained all debits and credits, including that we have paid a deposit with the Holiday Inn for the 2025 Louisiana Tour, Louisiana Secretary State Annual Report, and the hall we are renting for the Christmas Party. Once again, we don't have enough members in attendance to vote on his report. Charles asked if a club member is ready to step up and take over as Treasurer. We will provide sharp pencils with erasers and a calculator.

Jack recognized Brent Trauth, owner of the Red Maple and club member in good standing since last year.

Jack said that he and several other club members were helping Thomas, who is hosting the DeSoto Club National Convention; they are cooking and assisting with registration of about 90 attendees.

Ernie gave a brief on a recently passed act that affects small businesses and LLC's called the "Corporate Transparency Act" or CTA, 31 USC Sect 5336 ET Sec Q. Affected entities may have to file additional paperwork and if found in violation, could be subject to Civil or Criminal penalties.

Jack is encouraging that everyone to actively recruit new members to the club. Jack has a standing offer of a "FREE" meal to anyone who brings in a new member.

HCC Spark Program...Jack wrote an article about the Model "T", a longtime family member, tours they have participated in and recently making rear end repairs. • 1925 Ford Model T Touring -

Charles Kihnel came over last Wednesday and we put the differential back in the Model T. It sure was a lot easier to remove it than putting it in, but we finally got it in. The differential has a new ring & pinion with modern pinion bearings and updated axle thrust bearings. This unit is not a hypoid unit, but back lash does need to be set and after an hour or two of trying to figure out how to do it with only one side of the differential in its bearings I got it set to about 0.008". That's a lot better than the original 0.030". New spring shackle bushings were installed and sized and the unit is installed in the car. Now I have to start putting cotter pins back into all of the bolts, which is a major task before I put the brake drums and wheels back together.

1926 Lincoln Model L, 7 Passenger Sedan – A little background on this car. Somewhere around 1959 – 1960 it was spotted on a used car lot on Tulane Avenue by Andrew Navarre. Andrew apparently brought the car's whereabouts up at a meeting or some such discussion and John Savant (one of our Founders) bought the car. In 1992 Charles Kihnel was "looking" for a car to restore and bought the Lincoln from John. At that time Charles was able to "knock off the dust and drive the car." Then life



happened, Charlie's father who had been helping Charlie do the woodwork restoration on the car passed away. Andrew Navarre then became Charlie's mentor on the Lincoln's restoration, but then Andrew passed away. Wood work was still needed and work all but came to a stop.

• With a renewed vigor to complete the Lincoln, Charles began earnestly working on the car again in 2021 with the SPARK program. He's since completed the wood repair, installed the soft top,



completed stripping the paint from the aluminum body and applying an epoxy DTM primer to it. He's got a plan and the equipment to remove the body and expects to bring all of the body components to the paint shop within the next few weeks for painting.

• While the body components are being painted Charles will be restoring the chassis and driveline. Additionally Charles has others helping in the restoration such as a vendor whose family has been in the wire wheel business since 1926 will be restoring the wheels

and another specialty shop will be restoring the brightwork. Additionally

he's working with an upholstery shop to plan out the restoration of the interior.
