On Thursday

afternoon, Mary and I attended the judging school (you must attend at least one judging school during the year) to judge Friday's AACA event. On Friday morning, we also attended the judges' breakfast with about 400 judges to gear up for a big day of checking out some beautiful cars. We started judging around 10:00 AM. I've always

SPARK UPDATE 3

(Support Personnel And Restoration Kickstart) Jack Wade

• 1925 Ford Model T Touring

Griff is back together again, and I'm sure my late father-in-law "Griff "Griffin, from whom we inherited the T, would be happy to know that! A couple of weeks ago, I drove the T on a test drive to Independence, LA, to meet with the president of the Independence Italian Cultural Museum and our VP, Paul Villemarette. We learned about what the museum has to offer, but really, we wanted to test our T's drivability. I noted a couple of issues, such as the carburetor needed some work and the low band needed tightening. Since then, our daughter, Lauren, has come over and helped me with a few items on the top that needed mending. Griff is about ready to load up after I added a couple of LED lights to aid the poor incandescent single bulb on the back of the car.

• 1926 Lincoln Model L, 7 Passenger Sedan

- o Charles has removed the sedan body and transported it to a local painter as other items, such as the fenders.
- The knock-off Rudge wire wheels are with a wheel restoration shop whose family has been in the wire wheel business since 1926!
- o In the meantime, Charles has disassembled the differential to inspect, clean, and reassemble critical components, such as bearings and gears. Amazingly, the 97-year-old oil in the differential was not that dirty!
- o Next, the torque ball, torque tube, and pinion bearings will be checked.
- o New material for the upholstery has just arrived!

• 1931 Cadillac 452A, Roadster

- This car has been in my family since March 1961. Although my father envisioned the restoration of this car, he spent most of his life collecting parts and materials for the restoration. In August 2018 we moved from the house in Algiers to my home in Ponchatoula. The car was photographed and carefully disassembled bagging / tagging the parts.
- O The main focus was the body. Like Charles's Lincoln, the engineering of the bodies at the time this car was built was to use a hardwood structure as the main basis for the body lines. This is not a typical 2x4 type work, as there are few right angles or straight lines. I was fortunate enough to know a business that had both the pattern and the skill to re-create the entire wooden structure, and you don't want to know how much it cost! Having stated that, the car needed EVERYTHING made of wood to be replaced. Rot, wood-eating insects consumed it all! Next up metal work!

Some Thoughts on Halloween and Cars

There are a few movies with possessed cars, such as Stephen King's novel Christine, featuring a possessed 1958 Plymouth Fury that can repair itself while committing acts of violence. The car

controls its owner, Arnie Cunningham, on a path of destruction. In "The Car," another car terrorizes a small town. But possessed vehicles are not always scary. As a kid, I wanted to ride in Herbie, the Love Bug, although I don't know if I would trust Herbie now or any of the autonomous cars being discussed now...

Regarding older cars, whether it is Halloween or not, these old cars seem to have a mind of their own!


